

WAC Select Program: Parent Q&A



Q: Is WAC Select the right fit for my daughter?

A: WAC Select is a great fit for players who are passionate about softball, want to train at a higher level, and are ready for more time commitment and competitive expectations. If your daughter is motivated to improve year-round, enjoys pushing herself, and is interested in playing at the high school or college level, this may be a strong fit.

Q: What if my daughter doesn't make or isn't interested in the Select team?

A: That's absolutely okay—and very common. Our volunteer-led WAC teams continue to offer a fun, competitive, and meaningful softball experience. Many players choose this path and thrive both on the field and as part of our community. The Select Program is one of *many* ways to grow within WAC.

Q: Will my child still receive quality coaching on a traditional WAC team?

A: Yes. Our volunteer coaches are trained, supported, and committed to helping every player improve. WAC has a long history of developing great players through our volunteer-led teams, and that commitment remains just as strong today.

Q: What's the time commitment difference between WAC Select and traditional WAC teams?

A: Select teams have a more intensive schedule, including structured practices, development sessions, and travel tournaments across fall, winter, and spring. Traditional teams typically have a more local, seasonal schedule, with fewer off-season commitments—ideal for multi-sport athletes or families balancing other priorities.

Q: What if my daughter wants to try Select in the future but isn't ready now?

A: That's completely fine. Many players continue on a traditional team for a few seasons and move into Select when they feel more prepared. There's no "right" timeline—only what works best for your daughter's development and confidence.

Q: Will WAC still support all players equally?

A: Absolutely. Every WAC player—Select or traditional—is a valued part of our club. Our mission is to provide opportunities for *all* girls to grow, play, and succeed in the sport they love.
